The symbols depicted on the altar rails.

Now that the altar rails have been returned to the position at the front of the sanctuary, we can see, not only the quality of the craftsmanship, but also the symbols of the Eucharist depicted in the carvings. Those six symbols are: the pelican feeding her young; a basket of grapes; the Ark of the Covenant; a basket of loaves and fish; a sheaf of wheat; and the Lamb of God.

<u>The pelican feeding her young</u>. This is perhaps the most obscure of the symbols but is based on an ancient legend which preceded Christianity. The legend was that in time of famine, the mother pelican wounded herself, striking her breast with her beak to feed her young with her blood to revive them from death but in turn lost her own life.

Given this tradition, it can easily be seen why the early Christians adapted it to symbolise Our Lord Jesus Christ. We were dead to sin and have found new life through the Blood of Christ and Jesus continues to feed with His body and Blood in Holy Communion.

<u>The basket of grapes</u>. The grapes, of course are made into wine which at the Consecration becomes the Blood of Christ.

<u>The Ark of the Covenant</u>. In the Old Testament, the Ark of the Covenant was a chest which contained two stone tablets on which were written the Ten Commandments (The Word) (Exodus 25:10-16). The Ark was the mark of the Lord's intimate presence among his people. The Church Fathers see the Ark as a symbol of Christ, St Bonaventure described the Ark as a representation of the Holy Eucharist.

<u>A basket of loaves and fish</u>. The miracle of the loaves and fish, when the Lord says the blessing, breaks and distributes the loaves through his disciples to feed the multitude This prefigures the bread of the Eucharist, a bread which nourishes all his people throughout every age. The loaves and fish symbolise Christ giving Himself to us in Holy Communion.

<u>The sheaf of wheat</u>. The wheat of course, is made into bread which at the Consecration becomes the Body of Christ.

<u>The Lamb of God</u>. This symbol is the same as that at the foot of the altar. John the Baptist, when speaking of Jesus, says "Behold the Lamb of God. Behold Him who takes away the sin of the world". These words are said at every Mass when the priest holds the Body and Blood before us. The Lamb equals Christ equals the Eucharist.
