25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Why be envious because I am generous ..."

- 1. This parable should never be read out at an official Mass celebrated at a Trade Union Conference! The same wages being given to those who have worked for twelve hours as those labourers who only worked for one hour. Then, to add insult to injury, those who worked least were paid first. It does seem a bit rough on the hard 'grafters' who had sweated all the day long!
- 2. Going around the wards of a hospital in one of my previous parishes one day I came across an old gentleman who was clearly quire seriously ill. He was not able to hold an ordinary conversation and so I came straight to the point. "Would you like to receive the Sacraments?" I said. He shook his head; being persistent I continued "Why not?" and then, with a sad expression on his face, he answered "I've not kept up my faith." Being anxious about his state of mind and sometimes blunt I then added "I'll be back this evening after seven o'clock and you can decide then: if you are not up to Confession, we will say an act of contrition, I will absolve you and give you the Blessed Sacrament". He nodded. At 7:15 p.m. he nodded firmly and then received forgiveness and Holy Communion. From that time, his spirits began to revive. His return to the Sacraments reminded me of our Lord's story today. It seemed like a living example of the labourer hired at the eleventh hour.
- 3. People often complain that Catholics think that they can get away with anything because they can receive forgiveness in Confession. At every moment of our lives we are free to turn away from Almighty God or to turn back to Him. We can never be assured like the evangelical Christians claim, that we are already assured of eternal salvation. Each of us is free to say yes or no to God's invitation.
- 4. However hard we work for the Church, for our Master Jesus Christ or for his poor brothers and sisters in the world, we can never deserve or earn the reward of eternal life with God. You might say that the grumbling workers in the parable think they deserve more. We can feel like that because many of us have attempted to serve Christ in His Church for many years and can feel resentment with those who have been lazy, indifferent, or worse until almost their last hour before they die. But how could any of us really merit eternal life?

It would be like a five year old child in the reception class at school spending an hour or so painting a picture of their Mummy and Daddy and then expecting the picture to sell for a million pounds at an auction at Sotheby's in London. But sometimes we can have just such high expectations in our relationship with God. "Look at what I have done for you!" We may feel like saying to Almighty God. "I go to Mass, say my prayers to you, try to fulfil my

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responsibilities. "We do not deserve to receive the incredible reward to live in close proximity to the source of all love, beauty and truth. But we are offered the chance, whether we try to accept the invitation early or late. Getting back to the parable of the labourers, we do not hear what happens to any of the labourers who, even at the eleventh hour refuse to work in the Masters vineyard. Presumably, they were left alone with nothing.

5. Let us accept the generosity of our Creator who has called us to work for the harvest of souls in His world. No matter how selfless and conscientious, we can never deserve or presume the reward which is offered to us. We should not grumble at God's generosity to others; after all, really we are all weak, frail creatures in need of grace and forgiveness.

THE WORD

Year A • Psalter W



Today's Gospel passage tells of the workers in the vineyard who are hired at different times of the day, and so put in unequal amounts of work.

At the end of the day, the foreman is told to pay the wages in reverse order to the time when the labourers were employed, thus setting up the ones engaged at the beginning of the day to expect a higher rate of pay. Most people probably feel some sympathy with their indignant reaction on discovering that everyone receives the same remuneration.

Perhaps we might consider another point of view: that of the owner. It is not the fault of the workers that they found no employment until the final hour before dusk. They have indeed been "standing here idle all day", not because they were unwilling to work, but as they tell the landowner, it is "because no one has hired us". They also have families to feed, their needs are just as great as those of the others, who were probably younger and fitter and so chosen first. The owner sees their willingness to work, but also their need, and responds to that. In justice, the ones hired earlier have nothing to complain about because they receive the amount to which they agreed: their fault lies in criticising the owner for his generosity, and perhaps not appreciating the desperate situation and anxiety of those who were earlier passed over by all those who could have helped them with a day's employment.

REFLECT

n certain parts of the world today, the setting of this parable is acted out daily. Gangs of people gather at a pick-up point, a lorry arrives, and those engaged clamber aboard and are driven to a building site, roadworks or some agricultural place of work. Such people have no assured employment, therefore no certain pay, but they do have family responsibilities.

Translated into religious terms, we can see that there is a lesson here. It is tempting for a person to think that having been a practising Christian for a long time entitles them to some sort of special recognition. But the Gospel teaching is of our expectations being reversed; that God does not think as we do. The parable is concerned with the attitude of the owner. It is a trap: we instinctively, perhaps, side with those individuals who have borne the heat of the day and are annoyed that the most recent arrivals receive the same pay as they do. But the ones who come later are not "shirkers": they just were not given the same chances as the others. The Gospels show Jesus as being concerned with such people, those on the margins, who are written off by those who are socially and religiously respectable. But the master (God) does not write off this latter group either: rather he appeals to them to change their attitude, to see the others' situation from a different point of view. God's mercy extends to all, and there are no degrees of mercy.

TDXC

Make the sign of the cross with holy water: ask the Lord for the grace to see others as God sees them.



LEARN

The workers hired later are not "shirkers": they have been available all day; it is not their fault that no one has offered them work.

A theme throughout the Gospel tradition is that of reversal, for instance, "the last will be first and the first, last".

To be a disciple of Jesus is more important than the length of time that a person has been one.

GOSPEL

Matthew 20:1-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Jesus said to his disciples: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, 'You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage.' So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, 'Why have you been standing here idle all day?' 'Because no one has hired us' they answered. He said to them, 'You go into my vineyard too.' In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, 'Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first.' So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. 'The men who came last' they said 'have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat.' He answered one of them and said, 'My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?' Thus the last will be first, and the first, last."
